Careers and Transition News



On Friday 8 May, 12 Vocational Studies students attended an Emergency Response Course where students learnt about how to deal with potential work place emergencies. Part of the course provided participants with the knowledge to evaluate fire scenarios and take correct action in terms of evacuation procedures, evaluation of and suppression of fire. They all had the opportunity to put out a fire using a fire extinguisher.

Careers Evening

The Marlborough Careers Evening was held on Monday 15 June. Forty providers from universities, polytechnics and industry training organisations (ITOs) from around the country attended. It was a cold night but both students and parents came out in droves to seek advice on the various career options available. We received a lot of positive feedback from both providers and parents. The providers again commented that it is always a very well organised event with great turnout and a very engaged crowd. A big thank you to parents and caregivers who either accompanied or arranged for their son to attend.



Drivers Licence & Employment

One of the question employees often ask is "do you have a drivers licence?" Boys have missed out on employment opportunities because they haven't. The rules have changed and it is now more difficult and takes longer. They can't start the process until they are 16 and it takes two years unless they do a Defensive Driving Course which costs \$199 and reduces the time by six months. For most boys, they won't have a full licence until they are 18 and a number will have left school by then. Jobs which need a full licence will not be open to them.

It is really important that they start the process to get their Learners Licence on their 16th birthday but there is a cost;

Construction @ MBC

During the Construction course this year, the focus has been on completing various projects around the College. The aim of this is to provide variety which leads to the building of skills both physical and thinking with regards to how a job should be approached. By doing this, the boys have become well known around school and they have been very much appreciated by many members of staff with whom they would normally have had very little contact.

They have also had several speakers come to talk to them. The first was the foreman Jason, who was in charge of the builders who renovated parts of the Technology Block over Christmas. He was able to relate stories of his time as an apprentice and stressed to the boys how a job should be done well and to the best of their ability. Speed would come with practice but their main aim should be to do the job and to do it well. This has been reflected so far in the work that the boys have completed to date.

Another visitor to the school has been Amanda Williams who is the BCITO skills broker for this area. Her knowledge and advice has been invaluable to the boys. Her visits are now relatively frequent which provides us with a direct link to the building industry.

BCITO also put on a BBQ for about 50 students one lunchtime so that they could introduce themselves and answer any questions from the boys. The projects undertaken this year so far are: The new gate and entrance made in the fence by the new crossing on Scott St. The boys also dug the holes and cemented in the posts that they made. A new bench for Rm25, the Technology Engineering/ computer room to house new computers. New free standing tables, also for the computers in Rm25. A new table and drawers for the printer in the Tech Block.

TeenAg Club

In early June we had a visit from the New Zealand Young Farmers Club who have offered to



help us set up a TeenAg Club at Marlborough Boys' College. Parents and caregivers of students studying Agriculture/Horticulture were emailed to gauge the level of interest for this club. I am delighted to say that there was pleasing response and we will be looking at having our first meeting at the beginning of Term 3. In the meantime it would be great if students could think about what sort of activities and skills they would like to learn or do and speakers they would like to hear.



In addition to these projects, the boys have been working on their own personal projects within the Construction Room.

ANZAC Day 2015

On the 19th of March, Marlborough Boys' College held an ANZAC commemoration service. A wreath and poppy-laying ceremony and a roll of honour highlighted the Marlborough Boys' College service. Marlborough Boys' College student Francesco Martin, 17, helped organise the service. He said "One of the reasons we wanted to have it student-led was that it was students like us that went and fought. It's pretty unreal to think someone my age would be going off to war. It's about remembering the people who gave their lives for us." The ANZAC service was inspirational and made everyone remember the quote "Lest We Forget". **By Sam Archie**

GATE - Gifted and Talented Education

At Marlborough Boys' College, we recognise that individual students have individual learning needs. The focus for our teachers' professional learning this year has been reviewing how best to meet our students' individual needs in the classroom, through teaching practices collectively known as differentiation.

One of the groups of students with specific learning needs that we have been looking at are those who have the potential to achieve, or who are achieving, at a very high level, often called the Gifted and Talented. As part of this enquiry, our staff have reviewed the school's definition of Gifted and Talented and the following draft definition has been developed:

Marlborough Boys' College staff have been reviewing the school's definition of Gifted and Talented. As a result, the following draft definition was developed:

We believe that gifted students are those with the potential to excel, whilst talented students are those who are excelling, when compared with others of similar age, culture, experience or environment.

These students may show their potential and/or performance in one or more of the following areas:

Intrapersonal Intelligence

Academic Ability

Cultural Expression

Mechanical Ability

Social Intelligence

Creative Expression

Physical Ability

Technical Ability

This definition is now open for feedback from students, their whanau and the wider community.

NZQA Fees Reminder

The NZQA Fee of \$76.70 needs to be paid in full to the College by Tuesday 1 September 2015. Payment of the fee at a later time may incur an additional \$50 late fee imposed by NZQA.

Financial Assistance can be approved for families who meet at least one of the following criteria:

- Be receiving a Work and Income or Study Link benefit (benefit-based applications)
- Have a joint family income that would entitle you to receive a Community Services Card (income-based applications)
- Be a fee-payer with two or more children who are candidates, irrespective of family income (multiple candidate applications), where the total fees you would have to pay would otherwise be more than the \$200 multiple candidate maximum.

Anti-Bullying Mural for MBC

Several years ago a plan evolved to enhance the western exterior wall of the St Marys Parish hall. This wall overlooks the MBC front field. As this area is prone to graffiti it was thought that would be appropriate to attach a multi-panelled mural to this wall. Discussions took place with St Mary's Parish and the schools' concerned. A concept was agreed for this project to be completed in 2015.

The proposal involved the design and painting of a mural which has a theme supporting 'Anti-bullying'. The students thought that focussing on 'positives' would be appropriate. Liz Collyns was able to generously provide most of the funds for the project from Te Punanga Haumara (Safe Haven) as part of 'Bully Free Marlborough'. MBC provided 'man-power' and materials for refreshing the hall wall. The Year 12/13 'Art Scholarship' group and other MBC students were pleased to support this community focussed initiative.

The images on the panels were designed by the 'Art Scholarship' group and focus on many of the positives which happen at the college. Elements of reality are liberally mixed with fun and fantasy throughout this affirmative project. There is an underlying narrative within the 12 panelled mural. It illustrates the fictional journey of a Year 9 student at MBC as he progresses through his time at college.

In the first panel, nearest St Marys' Parish hall car park, you see his arrival as a wee lad to college. Along the way, across the 12 panels x 1.2m², he is shown discovering and enjoying some of the opportunities which are available to students at our college. These include the positive involvement through many aspects of school life including sports, academic, social and cultural endeavour. You observe, as you follow from right to left, his transition from junior to senior school. There are challenges and many decisions that he will need to make to ensure success. The final panels reflect the sense of achievement which the 'lad', now a fine young man, is seen as he 'graduates' and prepares to continue the next part of his life's journey.

Students at all levels, Years 9-13, enthusiastically worked together under direction from Art Department staff led by Mrs Deb Cave-Higgins.

Preparation and base coat painting of the 12 panels was completed by Year 9 students. Prefects and Year 12 Leadership students also helped by preparing the hall wall for the panels. All together a total of about 60+ students, plus staff and parents were involved in the various aspects required for this ambitious project. Roles within the venture included stencils of positive words, filming, co-ordination of food, etc. as well as the painting of the all the images on each panel. Ultimately the project was completed as a MURATHALON. 24 hours of 'consistency of commitment, skilful focussed painting, fun and food'. The Art Scholarship group were fully involved. They personally excelled and gained much from the most memorable experience.

Mrs Cave-Higgins, Mr Duppati and Mr McCloy (our MBC Art staff) also worked for the full weekend with the students to ensure completion of the panels.

As we operate a ‘pay - it - forward’ system the money from this year’s fundraiser will also be used to finance the early stages of the 2016 season and the new team.

Attendance

Regular attendance is vitally important to a student's success, and parents/caregivers are asked to ensure that absences are kept to an absolute minimum. When a student is absent from school, his parent/caregiver must phone the school as early as possible. Please use the attendance 24 hour answerphone to leave your message with Student's name and form group, absence dates and reason for absence follow up contact details, your name and relationship to student

You can also text absences to **3255**, Keyword **MBCA** or email attendance@mbc.school.nz and place 'attendance' in the subject line.

If you are not sure how long your son/ward will be away, please ring the College every day he is absent. The absence answerphone is for parent/caregivers use only – students may **not** phone for themselves.

A medical certificate may be required for extended medical absences.

Parents/caregivers who wish to remove students from school for a period of time must obtain permission from the Principal in writing, prior to the extended planned absence. We also have a prearranged absence form available on our website: under Student Support / Forms and Passwords/Planned Absence Notification. This is especially important for NCEA courses, because the New Zealand Qualifications Authority requires full attendance for course completion. It should be noted that students who are absent from aspects of Unit Standards courses, or assessment tasks for internally assessed credits, cannot be given estimated grades.

The school uses txtstream to inform you if your son/ward is marked absent period 1 (or his first class of the day). You will receive a text/email informing you of this. We request that you reply to this text.

Any queries please ring the school 578 0119 and speak to the Attendance Officer, Dean or your sons Form Teacher.

Students Leaving School During the Day -Signing Out/Signing In

Students in Years 9 to 12 are expected to stay on the school grounds unless they have signed out through the Deanery or have a lunch pass. If a student needs to leave school during the day he must complete the "**Signing Out Book**" at the Deanery.

Reasons for leaving school during the day may take the form of a phone message from the parent/caregiver or a note signed by the parent/caregiver, prior to the student leaving for his appointment. In either case please give the estimated time away from school. Students without the above will not be allowed to leave school. Students on their return from an appointment must **SIGN BACK IN**. This is an important and obvious safety issue, as we need to know where your son/ward is during school hours.

Late to School

It is important that your son arrives at school by 8.45am for an 8.50am start each day. (Thursday 9.45am if your son/ward is Y10-13). If your son/ward is **Late** to school he must complete a check-in note at the Deanery on his **first** arrival at school regardless of the time. Students with an explanatory note should produce this at their time of arrival at the Deanery.

Parents/caregivers can leave a prior message on the College attendance answer-phone.

Students who do not produce an excused note for their lateness will be regarded as truant.

Sickness while at school

If your son/ward is unwell they must **first** report to the front office and must **not** leave the school grounds without permission.

The Front Office will contact his parent/caregiver if this is required.

The Front Office stocks limited supplies of pain relief and antihistamines for emergencies only. Students who require medication should bring a clearly labelled supply and leave it at the Front Office.
